

Thank you for being a part of our learning series. We will build a productive faith-based framework to discuss race and work toward racial equity.

This is designed as a 5 part series, each session is an hour. Prior to the session, participants are asked to read or watch the material, in order to have meaningful and genuine conversations. Please come with your thoughts and questions.

Session 1:

Session 2:

Session 3:
